

She has coordinated these events for the past two years but is looking for two people to take over the coordination of the Clean-up effort and the Hob Nob. She has found someone to coordinate the Faceters Frolic for next year. Diana gave a short description of all three events for new members: The Clean-up effort takes place the Saturday before the Hob Nob. 
OCTOBER BIRTHSTONE: OPAL

Those who celebrate a birthday in October have the honor of a birthstone unlike most others: the colorful variety of silicon dioxide known as *Opal*. Opal, chemical formula SiO2nH20, is basically the amorphous form of chalcedony. It has a Moh's Hardness between 5 - 6, a conchoidal fracture, and a density that varies between 2.0 - 2.2, depending on water content. The water content in opal varies; it is typically 3 - 9 wt% (percent by weight) but can be up to 20 wt%. Although opal isn't crystalline in the usual sense, order of some kind exists: opal consists of a dense packing of spheres, typically 1500 - 3000 angstrom in diameter. In

common opal without play-of-color, the size of the spheres varies greatly, whereas the spheres in precious opals (those with play-of-color) are so uniform in size that they form a regular lattice, in which the light is refracted. In some opals the spheres are completely

amorphous, whereas in other opals the spheres are partially crystalline and consist of disordered layers of tridymite and cristobalite. Opal occurs in fissures and cavities in various rocks, where it is deposited by hydrous solutions at relatively low temperatures. It occurs as siliceous sinter or 'geyserite' at hot springs and geysers and constitutes the majority of diatomites, which are finegrained chalk-like deposits formed by the accumulation of shells from diatoms.

Fire Opal refers to opal (with or without play-of-color) from

Quetaro, Mexico, that principally comes in bright orange and red body colors. *Black Opal* refers to opal with a black body color, whereas *Crystal Opal* or *Hyalite* refers to opal with no body color, and is clear (except those pieces with heavy play-of-color!) *Boulder Opal* refers to ironstone concretions sporting opal found in Queensland, Australia. Most precious opals are from the various sandstone deposits in Australia, but they are also found in Ethiopia, Brazil, Mexico, and even the United States.

A rare exhibit titled *Cameos: Sculpture in Miniature* is opening on November 28, 2015 at the Phoenix Art Museum, in downtown Phoenix, Arizona. The cameo collection was acquired in 1944 by world renowned jeweler Pierre Touraine, who created inspiring jewelry from the 1930's until the 1970's.

Join me and curatorial assistant Chelsea Ellsworth for a very special private tour of this exhibit. We will meet at the lobby of Phoenix Art Museum on Friday December 4, 2015, at 1:00pm. We are truly fortunate that Ms. Ellsworth has made time on her busy schedule for our tour!!

You are welcome to go earlier and tour the museum. I will be there lecturing to the museum docents on "Carved gems: Origins, Inspirations & Skills", and we'll all meet at 1:00pm. If you are planning to join us, please RSVP at helen@gemartcenter.com so we have a count of attendees.

About the Touraine Cameo Collection

The Pierre J. and Velma J. Touraine cameo collection was donated in 1983 by the estate of Pierre Touraine to the Phoenix Art Museum. The origin and creation of the cameos is shrouded in mystery. Sadly, we don't know anything about the original collection owner, the cameo artists, or where the cameos were created. The first and only time the Touraine cameo collection was shown to the American public was in May of 1954 at the Glendale Gem Festival, the annual show sponsored by the Glendale Lapidary & Gem Society, in Glendale, California.

Phoenix Art Museum curatorial assistant Chelsea Ellsworth is responsible for curating this Cameo exhibit; she contacted me some months ago asking for some help with these cameos. She has done some incredible work researching the history, timeline and iconography of the cameos. Ms. Ellsworth was very kind to invite me to the Phoenix Art Museum for a private viewing of the collection. The 174 unmounted pieces in the collection were fitted in precise cutout openings in 11 wooden box frames, the way they were displayed at the 1954 show. Most of

them are carved in agate; many are in banded black-and-white or brown-and white onyx, while others are in orange-and-white sardonyx, and several are engraved in pure cornelian. A handful of them are carved in different materials, such as turquoise, variscite, rock crystal, and shells. The vast majority are cameos with a few intaglios, dating from 100-200 years ago. They are tiny masterpieces ranging in size from less than an inch to over two inches across. Themes depict figures and scenes inspired from the ancient Greek mythology, as well as some historical portraits.

I am overwhelmed with the artistry of these pieces and intrigued by the mystery surrounding the collection and the artists. The *Cameos: Sculpture in Miniature* exhibit will be on display for a very limited time until April 17, 2016, and should not be missed by any art and gem lovers.


