August 8, 2026 OPLC speaker - Dr. Larry Fellows

Wings Over Wilcox and Road Scholar Geology Programs

We are in for another great treat for our August 8, 2026, OPLC monthly meeting. Past Arizona State Geologist and retired Director of the Arizona Geological Survey, Dr. Larry Fellows, will be talking to us about the **Wings Over Wilcox geology field trips** and **Road Scholar Geology programs**. Larry is a returned speaker to OPLC; he has given us three great presentations on the Geologic Features in Southern Arizona, Pompeii and Herculaneum, and the Grand Canyon.

In recent years, Larry has been leading annual geology field trips at **Wings Over Wilcox**, which are part of the Wings Over Willcox Birding and Nature Festival held every January, and the **Road Scholar Program** offered in Cochise County, with geology, of course, being the basic reason both these programs are offered. He will explain the relationships between those programs and the geology by using non-technical and semi-technical explanations and by trying to draw club members, with their different areas of expertise, into the discussions. Topics covered will include the Willcox Playa, Texas Canyon, the Chiricahua Mountains and other places that participants have driven through but never given much thought to. General subjects include the hydrologic cycle, weathering, erosion, plate tectonics, intrusive rocks, the major historical geologic "chapters" in S AZ, and the current Ice Age (Earth's 5th).

The photo above on the right was taken at Hutton's Section in Edinburgh, where the science of modern geology began in the late 1700s, about the same time the Colonies were successfully doing battle with the Redcoats in New England.

Dr. Larry Fellows, born and raised in Iowa, earned degrees in geology from Iowa State College, University of Michigan, and University of Wisconsin. After working in petroleum exploration and teaching at the university level, he began employment at the Missouri Geological Survey. In 1979, Larry was selected to be director of the Arizona Geological Survey and the first official Arizona State Geologist, a position he held until his retirement in 2005. He transformed the Bureau of Geology and Mineral Technology into the modern Geological Survey.

The Museum at Texas Tech University ~ Rare Behind-the-Scenes Tour of the Paleontology Lab

With the occasion of the [Lubbock Gem & Mineral Society show](#) held in Lubbock, Texas, in late September 2025, I had an incredible opportunity to experience a behind-the-scenes tour of the Museum of Texas Tech's Paleontology lab with Dr. Jeffrey W. Martz, Curator of Paleontology and Director of the Antarctic Research Center. Although fossils may not be my main field of interest, I find the Age of the Dinosaurs fascinating, as well as the work being done at the Museum of Texas Tech University (MATTU) paleontology lab, in the museum's basement.

Texas Tech University (TTU)

Lubbock is home to the Museum at Texas Tech University (MATTU) and the Lubbock Lake Landmark (an active archaeological site), two major museums with exhibits on dinosaurs and mammoths that roamed the plains of Prehistoric Texas. The Museum at TTU was established as the West Texas Museum in 1929, and in 1969, it took its present name. It serves two roles: that of scientific research and education. It is a world-class facility with over seven million object collections, with temporary and permanent exhibitions in the arts, humanities, and natural sciences.

Just beyond the museum's entrance, skeletal replicas of full-size *Tyrannosaurus rex* and *Triceratops horridus* dinosaurs welcome the visitors. The "Changing World Dinosaurs Gallery" and educational exhibits feature more full-skeleton dinosaurs,

explaining the dinosaur family tree and their classification. Dinosaurs lived approximately 240–66 million years ago, during the Mesozoic Era, also known as the “Age of the Dinosaurs”, which is divided into three periods: the oldest being the Triassic (240–208 million years ago), the Jurassic (208–146 million years ago), and the Cretaceous (146–66 million years ago).

I followed Dr. Martz to the museum’s basement and visited the first lab room, where many fossils were lying in protective plaster casts. I was amazed by the huge number of small fragments waiting to be matched together as in a puzzle. Drawers with endless teeth specimens and tiny fragments are waiting to be put together by students or volunteers. The collection rooms were full of cabinets, with numerous drawers chock-full of all kinds of fossil vertebrae. One of Dr. Martz’s focuses and research has been the Triassic-

period paleontology, and especially the phytosaur, crocodile-like dominant aquatic carnivores of the Triassic, which could exceed twenty feet in length. Although the phytosaur resembled modern crocodiles, looking at one of these skulls, Dr. Martz pointed out that the nostrils were located at the very front of the skull in front of the eyes, in contrast to modern crocodiles, where they are at the end of the snout. I also enjoyed looking at some fossils that exhibited unique undulating textures.

A lot of current repair work in the lab encompasses correcting old repairs on fossils. Today, they use a liquid plastic called Paraloid both as glue and as a solvent when diluted, which can be easily removed and causes no harm to the fossils. A partial phytosaur skull, along with a number of vertebrae discovered in Borden County, in the Triassic Cooper Canyon formation of the Dockum Group, was being repaired from older repairs, executed with the wrong glue materials. Another skull and post-cranial fossil from the Post Quarry in Garza County, Texas, discovered in 1983, exhibited evidence of old repairs. A skull, a new occurrence of *Buettnererpeton bakeri* (Temnospondyli:

Metoposauridae) placed in its own genus in 2022, from the Norian (Cooper Canyon Formation, Dockum Group) of West Texas, was also lying on the counter. Another rarity caught my attention, the horn-like fossil of the large reptile *Desmatosuchus*, which would be situated on top of the animal’s shoulder. A rare specimen in the collection is the Ashmore Meteorite, discovered during deep plowing near the

community of Ashmore, in Gaines County, Texas. It has been sliced and polished. The next room houses the fossil collection from Antarctica. One box had a flipper of a late Cretaceous plesiosaur, from Seymour Island, discovered in 1982, while a second box held bones of another plesiosaur from the same island.

Dr. Martz explained that, “During the Triassic Period, life underwent one of the most important evolutionary radiations in Earth history between the Great Dying at the end of the Permian and the establishment of more modernized and dinosaur-dominated ecosystems in the Jurassic. The past 40 years have led to an improved understanding of the transitional nature, complexity, and global variability of Triassic ecosystems as the Paleozoic world faded and the Mesozoic world emerged. In the Western Interior of the United States, the Triassic

terrestrial fossil record is best known from the Early-Middle Triassic Moenkopi Formation and Norian-Rhaetian Chinle Formation of the Colorado Plateau, the Late Carnian-Rhaetian Dockum Group around the edge of the Southern High Plains, and the Carnian-Norian Chugwater Group of the Rocky Mountains.” The Triassic research in the Western United States has seen three “Renaissance” eras: first between 1915 and the beginning of World War II, the second between 1967 and 1995, and the third, which began in the early 2000s and is still underway, with better CT scanning and 3D modeling technology.

Dr. Jeffrey Martz

Dr. Jeffrey W. Martz is a geologist and paleontologist who studies animals and environments of the Late Triassic Period, the beginning of the Age of Dinosaurs. With a Bachelor’s degree in Zoology from Colorado State University in Fort Collins in 1999, he conducted his graduate studies at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, where he began to specialize in the study of Upper Triassic stratigraphy and vertebrates. Dr. Martz received his Master’s degree and PhD in Geosciences from Texas Tech University in 2002 and 2008, respectively. He then worked at the Petrified Forest National Park in northern Arizona,

the Denver Museum of Nature and Science, the Mesalands Community College in Tucumcari, New Mexico, the Utah Geological Survey, and as Assistant Professor of Geology at the University of Houston-Downtown. His work resulted in publications and open-file reports relating to Upper Triassic stratigraphy and paleontology. Dr. Martz took over as Curator of Paleontology at the Museum of Texas Tech University in the fall of 2024.

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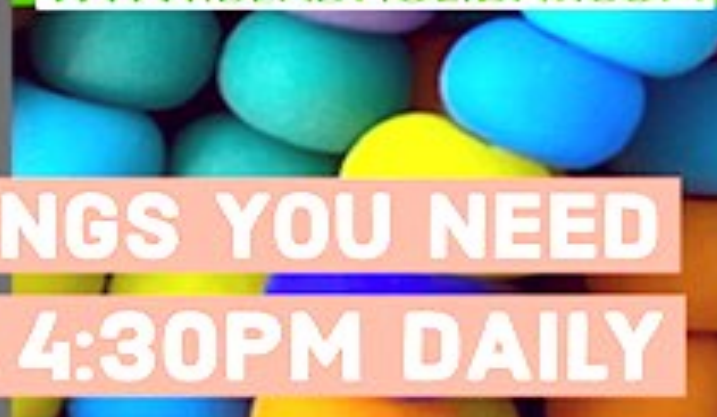
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IMPORTANT - PLEASE READ - PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES TO BE VOTED ON AT THE MEETING

PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE BY-LAWS. (Changes will be voted on at the August meeting. Proxy votes received prior to the meeting will be counted also.) Change recommendations are in bold print. (Only paragraphs changed are shown.)

ARTICLE VI – NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 2. NOMINATING COMMITTEE. The Nominating Committee shall consist of a Chairman, who shall be a member of the Board of Directors, and two (2) or more other members on good standing of the club.

The Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President, who shall not be a member, and approved by the Board of Directors at least one (1) week prior to each Annual Meeting, to serve from the close of such meeting until the close of the next Annual Meeting. ***In May of the current year.*** (The Committee, so appointed, in effect, provides nominations for election one year after its appointment.)

The Committee shall nominate one person for each office and for each vacancy on the Board of Directors. **The Committee's nominations shall be listed on the proxy statement sent to each member in good standing along with the notice of the Annual Meeting. The Committee's nominations shall be listed on the proxy statement sent to each member in good standing along with the notice of the Annual Meeting one month prior to the Annual Meeting or before.** Members of the Nominating Committee shall not be precluded from being nominated.

Section 3. ELECTIONS. At the appropriate place in the agenda of the Annual Meeting, the President shall ask the Chairman of the Nominating Committee to read the Committee's recommendations; the report does not require acceptance. ***At the Meeting just prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall ask the Chairman of the Nominating Committee to read the Committee's recommendations; the report does not require acceptance.*** He then shall ask for any nominations from the floor and shall inquire of the Secretary as to any nominations submitted by proxy, with such nominations being treated as nominations from the floor. Additional proxy nominations must be received by the Secretary at least two(2) weeks prior to the Annual Meeting.

Votes cast by proxy shall be counted as cast and all proxies not indicating a preference, shall be voted as determined by a majority vote of the Board of Directors or by the members present who may have been delegated in writing to do so by the proxy voter.

At the Annual Meeting, if there are no previously submitted nominations, the President shall ask for a voice vote to declare those nominated by the Committee elected. If there have been additional nominations received the election of officers and directors shall be by secret ballot. Each person present shall be given a ballot and shall cast one (1) vote for one (1) candidate for each office and for each Director's position. The ballots, as collected, shall be placed in a sealed box and the President shall appoint three (3) tellers, not nominees, to count them. Tellers shall count the ballots and the votes cast by proxies, obtaining the proxies from the Secretary. The tally of all votes shall be given to the President for announcement to those present. Each nominee receiving a majority of votes cast shall be declared elected.

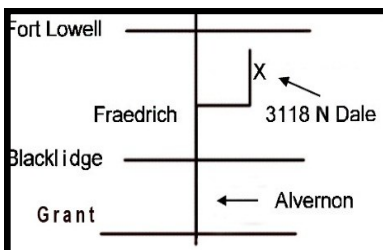

AUGUST GEMSTONE: PERIDOT

Peridot is the gemstone for August, and the name of gem-grade **Olivine**. Olivine is a nesosilicate that occurs as orthorhombic crystals (typically combinations of pinacoids, prisms, and bipyramids), and is mostly granular. It shows no distinct cleavage, and has a conchoidal fracture. Hardness varies from 6.5 - 7.0 on the Moh's scale. It has vitreous luster and is transparent to translucent. Color is from yellowish-green, olive-green, and brown to black with increasing Fe content. There is a complete solid-solution series from *forsterite* (MgSiO_4) to *fayalite* (FeSiO_4). Fe is present as Fe^{2+} and substitutes directly for Mg^{2+} . Common olivine has more Mg than Fe. In the crystal

structure of olivine, layers of $[(\text{Mg},\text{Fe})\text{O}_6]$ octahedral are linked by isolated $[\text{SiO}_4]$ tetrahedral. Mg and Fe are randomly distributed in the octahedral positions. Olivine is an important rock-forming mineral, and typically occurs in melanocratic (dark-colored) basic or ultrabasic igneous rocks such as basalt, peridotite, and dunite. In dunite, olivine is by far predominant. It alters to antigorite or other serpentine minerals. Forsterite is also found in metamorphosed dolomitic limestones. Olivine is a common mineral in stony meteorites and constitutes a substantial part of the upper mantle of the Earth.

Peridot, the gem-quality version of Olivine, isn't hard to find. We have the world's most prolific and reliable source here in San Carlos, Arizona. Larger gem crystals from San Carlos have always been hard to find, but a newer source is Pakistan, where the crystals are not only much larger, but typically sport more magnesium (and therefore better apple-green color!) Other new sources include Tanzania, North Korea, China, Vietnam, and a few other south-Asian countries. Peridot can be pesky to polish, but produces beautiful faceted gemstones - give it a try!
